Paul Clement is a partner in the Washington, D.C., office of Kirkland & Ellis LLP, and a Distinguished Lecturer in Law at Georgetown University Law Center. Paul served as the 43rd Solicitor General of the United States from June 2005 until June 2008. Before his confirmation as Solicitor General, he served as Acting Solicitor General for nearly a year and as Principal Deputy Solicitor General for over three years. Paul has argued over 90 cases before the United States Supreme Court, including *McConnell v. FEC*, *Tennessee v. Lane*, *Rumsfeld v. Padilla*, *United States v. Booker*, *MGM v. Grokster*, *ABC v. Aereo*, *Hobby Lobby v. Burwell*, and *Jesner v. Arab Bank*. Paul argued six cases this last term alone and has argued more Supreme Court cases since 2000 than any lawyer in or out of government. He has argued more than 100 times in the federal courts of appeals, including in landmark cases like *United States v. Moussaoui* and *NFL v. Brady*.

Paul is a native of Cedarburg, Wisconsin, and a graduate of its public schools. He received degrees from Georgetown University, Cambridge University and Harvard Law School, where he served as the Supreme Court editor of the Harvard Law Review. Following law school, Paul clerked for Judge Laurence H. Silberman of the U.S. Court of Appeals for the D.C. Circuit and for Associate Justice Antonin Scalia of the U.S. Supreme Court. After his clerkships, he went on to serve as Chief Counsel of the U.S. Senate Subcommittee on the Constitution, Federalism and Property Rights.

First appointed to the Detroit Common Pleas Court by Governor William Milliken, Judge Talbot served the people of Michigan on the bench for 40 years.</p> <p>During his tenure, Judge Talbot presided in nearly all levels of Michigan courts and also served on the Judicial Tenure Commission. Most notably, from the bench, Judge Talbot has been recognized for his commitment to guarantee victims a place in court and a voice at sentencing. As an administrator, Judge Talbot has been widely praised for his dedicated efforts to transform the 36th District Court into a more efficient, customer-focused high volume urban court while at the same time balancing their budget. He also created a trial court – the Court of Claims – within the Court of Appeals to hear claims against the state and to decide them consistently and fairly.</p> <p>Off the bench, among many other volunteer commitments, Judge Talbot has chaired the Detroit Archdiocese Board of Review dealing with abusive and errant Roman Catholic priests, was past chair of the Archdiocese Board of Education, and serves as a trustee of Madonna University, Sacred Heart Seminary, and the Archdiocese Endowment Fund.</p>
